9 - 10:15 am Session A: Rethinking the "Conjure" Chest Deana Thomas, University of Kentucky Session Location: Classroom A

The conjure chest has been a part of Kentucky history since it was donated to the Kentucky Historical Society (KHS) in 1976 and has since that time been called the deadliest piece of furniture in the world and been featured in a number of books and paranormal TV shows and podcasts. But through analysis of the chest's original source, a 1946 letter from Virginia Cary Hudson to her daughter, as well as genealogical research on Hudson, the story of the chest falls apart. Additionally, the history of how KHS interpreted the chests raises issues with the limitations of family stories.

Session A: Goldilocks and the Three Museums: Best Practices for School Tours at Museums of All Sizes

This program features presenters from a variety of institutions each offering their best practices for school tours. Representatives from organizations of all sizes ranging from the Kentucky Derby Museum, which hosts 15,000 students annually, to the Speed Art Museum with 5,000 students each year, and the Little Loomhouse, which sees about 1,200 students annually will share their experiences and strategies. All aspects of school tour planning will be covered including nitty gritty logistics, effective tour strategies, and engaging on-site programming. Like Goldilocks, finding the "just right" balance is key. Attendees will explore what works best for different groups and settings.
